

#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Hello everyone,

With harvest in full swing, we're matching that energy here at school with a range of exciting, creative, and forward-thinking activities!



Earlier this year, we asked for feedback regarding Out of School Hours Care (OSHC) at our site. Thanks to the positive interest from families, we're now in early discussions with the Department to explore options for potentially offering this service, with the earliest implementation being 2026. This is a preliminary step, but we are eager to continue investigating ways to support our community's needs.

Last Friday, we welcomed Alex, our new local Police Officer, for a visit. She spoke to our secondary girls, reminding them to stay vigilant online and avoid connecting with people they don't know personally on social media. It was impressive to see our students demonstrate maturity and an understanding of safe online practices.

Attached to this newsletter you will find information re a poll to increase our Material and Services Charges for 2025. This funding is the money that is used to buy resources for the school. Whilst we are a government funded public school, the Material and Services charge is the income from families that ensures we are able to purchase resources such as books, IT equipment, paper, paint, software. In order to offer rich experiences there is a need to increase fees so that we are able to purchase a range of resources to meet the changing curriculum needs of our students. It is not permitted to be used for staffing, building or playgrounds but does allow us to free up funds for these ongoing expenses.

## 7B at the Aboriginal Education Community Expo and learn about West Coast Youth

Students of 7B have been learning about empathy during pastoral care lessons this term. The idea of putting yourself in someone else's shoes is a foreign idea for them. Homelessness is a major issue facing many communities, even ours.

The Aboriginal Education Community Expo held at Mallee Park was important for us to attend. Aboriginal Education was showcased by all of the schools in Port Lincoln and the students engaged well with the Aboriginal Education Networking team and activities. They learned that this education is important in closing the gap and supported our Aboriginal students to learn more about their culture.

The opportunity arose for us to learn more about homelessness in Port Lincoln at this time through a visit to the West Coast Youth Hub prior to the Expo. Students immediately engaged within the space and were interested when the West Coast Youth leaders discussed their roles and the support for the homeless they provide. Our journey will continue as of this week as we work out how we can provide for the homeless.

We all visited "Snooks Landing" an important place for the Barngarla Peoples. The students had a moment to walk on Country and share time together enjoying it. Everyone had an opportunity to connect with Country and each other.

In signing off I would like to mention that we are lucky to have the Aboriginal Education Networking Meeting held at CAS on Wednesday Week 6. We have an opportunity to engage with the group and to showcase our inclusive and cross-curricular cultural learning with them. How lucky are we to be able to share our positive practices with the people of Port Lincoln?

## Miss Indiah's Foundation/Year 1 Gardening & Kitchen story

This year, my class has been involved in the Stephanie Alexander Garden Kitchen program. I had seen the benefits of the program at Ungarra Primary School and wanted to provide this experience for my students at Cummins Area School. The purpose of this program is to introduce pleasurable food education during their learning years, in order to form positive food habits for life. The program encourages critical thinking, teamwork, an understanding of cause and effect and increased levels of observation.

We started out small by purchasing the F-2 garden Kitchen Syllabus book and clearing out the preexisting garden beds and cleaning the JP kitchen. From here, we gained community support from Cummins Hardware store who generously donated soil, seed and worm farms to contribute to our startup. We had a huge day of digging out the old garden beds, layering shredded paper and manure, digging holes for our in-ground worm farms and topping the beds with new soil. Initially we planted fast growing produce; radishes, carrots, lettuce, spinach, parsley and basil. During this period, students took care of their garden by watering it, creating 'do not pick signs' and explaining to other classes how to put scraps in our worm farm. The excitement and pride they showed in their garden was a core memory for the year!

I had been following the Stephanie Alexander Facebook page for tips and ideas and in around May they advertised a "Start Small, Dream Big" grant. The grant was for \$1500 and included a 2-Year membership to the full program. Of course, I decided to apply for this grant and with the help of my trusty students, we put together a paragraph and pictures of why this money would benefit us and what we would use it for. Long story short, out of over 1400 applicants, we were 1 of the 20 successful winners and the kids were over the moon! We haven't spent our money yet, however we are looking to purchase extra cooking equipment and expand our current garden space.

During the year we have also planted broccoli, cauliflower, pumpkin and potatoes. We have cooked a number of dishes with our produce including smoothies, dip, spinach & feta triangles, carrot cake, salads and pumpkin scones. It has been extremely rewarding to see students involvement in the whole process of growing their produce, harvesting the food, preparing and cooking the food and sitting together and sharing what they have made. This program has engaged all the senses and offered a rich and varied link with many areas of the curriculum. I look forward to building on their curiosity and energy next year.

#### **CUMMINS AREA SCHOOL CANTEEN UPDATE**

**CUMMINS AREA SCHOOL CANTEEN BUILDING PROGRESS:** Currently, we are awaiting the completion of the final piece of infrastructure—the ramp at the canteen entrance. We are optimistic that this will be finished in the coming weeks. In the meantime, we will continue to offer modified lunch orders on Mondays and Fridays, along with ice cream sales in the Plaza starting at 1:30 PM on those days. RRHAN-EC TRAINING: All volunteers are now required to complete RRHAN-EC training. This course, Responding to Risks of Harm, Abuse and Neglect - Education and Care, is a brief online program focused on mandatory notifications and child protection in education. You only need to complete the free Fundamentals Course, which can be accessed through the Education Department's online learning management system, Plink: Department for Education Plink - Dashboard page. If you don't have a Plink account, you can create a Non-Department for Education staff account from the Plink dashboard. Some volunteers may have already completed this training, but we aim to have all Canteen volunteers trained within the next six months as we enter the new school year. 


## **Scholastic Book Fair:**

#### **Student Lunch Passes**

Students leaving the school grounds during the lunch break must carry a LUNCH PASS. There are two types of passes.

1. REGULAR LUNCH PASS: These will be issued at the beginning of each year on the written request of parents.

These passes are for students returning to their own home for lunch regularly. This pass is not to be used to access local shops to purchase lunch.

They may be issued to cover one or more days each week.

**2. SPECIAL LUNCH PASS:** Students are sometimes required to leave school for particular reasons on isolated occasions e.g. hair cuts, personal shopping, lunch at a friends, or a birthday party.

For each occasion, the student requires **a written request from parents through Daymap**. Students will not be permitted to phone home during the day to access a lunch pass.

Students in Year 6 or younger must be accompanied by an adult when they leave the school grounds and have the written consent of their parents if the adult signing them out is not their parent.

Students in Year 7/8/ 9 must have written parental consent and be accompanied by another student the same age or older.

Students in Year 10 - 12 are able to leave the school grounds by themselves provided they have written parental consent. Our preference would be that they don't leave the school grounds alone.

All students who leave the school at Lunch time must sign out at the computer located at the Front Office. They must sign in on their return. This is an WHS requirement and applies to students with both Permanent and Daily Lunch passes.





#### **2025 Fees**

The Governing Council proposes the amounts for the Materials and Services charges for 2025 are \$425 (\$23 increase on 2024) Foundation to Year 6, and \$521 (\$27 increase on 2024) for Years 7-12. These fees are above the minimum set out by DECD by \$125 (\$10 increase on 2024) per student and are detailed in the notices included in this newsletter.

In addition to Materials and Services charges as outlined above, there is a proposal to charge a subject fee for Design & Technology (Technical Studies) per semester as follows:

Year 9 (WOODWORK): \$35Year 9 (METALWORK): \$35

Year 9 (ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY): \$20

Year 10 (WOODWORK): \$55
 Year 10 (METALWORK): \$55

Year 10 (ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY): \$55

It is the intention of the Governing Council to obtain approval for this fee rise via a parent/caregiver poll. This charge will be finalised at the next Governing Council meeting on Tuesday, 12th November at 7pm in the Library. All parents/caregivers/students are invited to attend this meeting and participate. #### Poll:

The polling process is set out by the Department for Education. Each family receives one vote per student. The poll must be conducted following the Governing Council meeting on 12th November 2024 and will be online. A link will be emailed to school families and there will be a 2 week period for voting to occur. The result will be determined by 50% + 1 of the votes. A poll outcome in favour of the fee rise above the minimum will mean the fees are compulsory (except for students with school cards). A poll outcome against the increase will mean the Governing Council will only seek the amount above the minimum as a voluntary contribution.

#### Reasoning for increasing fees:

The Materials and Services Charges fees are directed toward the daily use of items set out on the attached notices. Extra funds for these items allows the school to redirect funds within their flexible budget that would otherwise be spent on provision of materials. As a Governing Council, we are constantly looking at options to positively influence the learning of Cummins Area School students. The proposed fee will raise an estimated amount of \$50,000 for the 2025 school year.

This money supports covering some of the costs of our Materials and Services, but further enables:

- Improvement of student access to Information Technology including online services, wireless access, printers and computer hardware.
- Provision of items relevant to a supportive and integrative learning environment.
- The use of the latest advances in curriculum, including printing for students and photocopying of student resources.

## **BYOD LAPTOP PROGRAM**FOR YR 7-12 STUDENTS

All students from Year 7 to Year 12 are required to supply their own laptop for use at school.

We ask that ALL purchases of new laptops for school use, for all year levels, be made via the School Ordering Portal. This alleviates the current issue of the many varied devices being purchased which do not meet the required minimum specifications for use at school.

The online Order Portal provides families with a variety of suitable devices which meet the required specifications, including some accessories, insurance and finance options. The devices found on the portal have been chosen for their battery performance, durability of cases, network compatibility and based on recommendations from industry experts.

#### Other considerations when purchasing a device for your student:

- Insurance: check your home contents insurance to see if the device will be covered
- Transport between home and school: device should be carried in a sturdy protective bag away from food & water bottles
- **Charging:** Students must charge their device at home and bring it to school every day fully charged. (Personal power adapters are not to be used at school unless Tag Tested).
- Students have access to **Microsoft Office 365** via their School email account at no cost, providing access to Word, Excel, Powerpoint, One Drive etc. There is no need to purchase this software separately.
- Whilst enrolled at school, students are connected to the school provided internet and are protected by a significant Departmental filtering system that prevents access to many harmful or malicious sites. According to Cummins Area School ICT Acceptable Use Policy, students may use the internet only for learning related activities that are approved by a teacher.
- It is the responsibility of the student / parent / caregiver to setup the Home-Internet connection on the device.
- Students must perform 'Software Updates' on the device as they become available in order to install the latest virus definitions and security patches.
- Students will use OneDrive provided through Office 365 which safeguards work from being lost on a USB etc. Students are also strongly encouraged to backup necessary files in numerous locations, including via email where appropriate. Technology failure is not an approved circumstance for extensions at Cummins Area School.

\*Device chosen must take into consideration the types of subjects the student is studying eg; Design related subjects may require an i7 (Senior High School students)

\*\*Please note; Apple devices are not recommended for use in our school environment as they are not compatible with our school network and will impact your child's ability to access school services such as printing. Apple devices will not be supported by the School IT Department.
